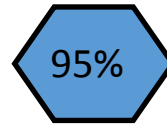


2017 ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS AND STUDENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

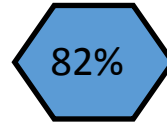
Congratulations to the 2017 senior students on their final academic results.

As an academic non-selective school, with **93% of students OP eligible**, we are proud of the students academic achievements. We believe that all students have the right to be educated to their fullest potential.

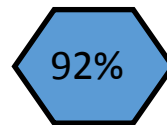

of the students received a QCE or a QCIA.

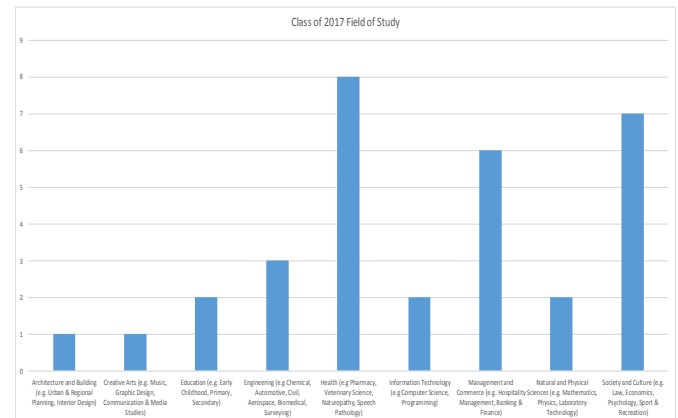


of the students applied to pursue study via QTAC.

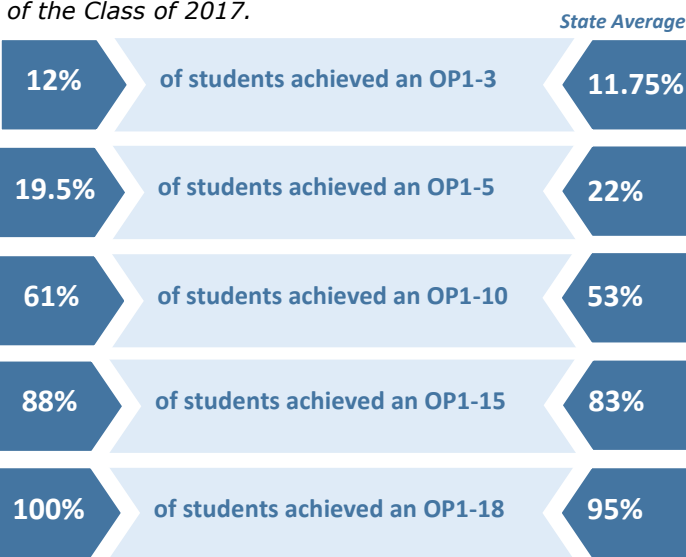
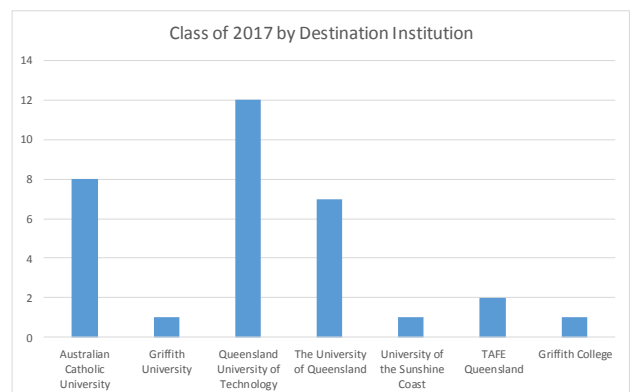


of the students received their first preference. 95% received their first or second preference.
